

Tasting Other People's Spit

On a recent visit to one of the local fast food outlets, with my grand son, I noticed, how some people would read the free newspaper. Invariablely, they would take the paper with them, to their seat and lick their fingers to open each page. Usually at the upper right hand corner, of the right hand page. When they finished reading it, they placed it, back in the rack.

As my grand son was enjoying himself in the playroom, I delayed our leaving so I could keep an eye on the newspaper. This had stirred my curiosity. How many other people had read the free news paper and licked their fingers in the same way? I observed three other people, had read the paper in the same way.

So if you visit a fast food outlet, Doctor's office, Dentist's office, Barber shop, and read, and handle the literature there, you are probably handling many other people's spit.
