




Each registered participant will receive 30 chips.

BID-EUCHRE

Bid-euchre is played with 2 card decks, using Jacks to the Aces. Players bid the number of tricks their team (normally 2 player teams) will win in each hand. Points are awarded based on the achievement (or not) of the suit/ bid.

If you have a working knowledge of how to play traditional euchre, then you should consider coming out and trying this version.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Bidding Slams

During the month of September Elaine Dinelle & Arnold Baldwin completed a small slam non-vulnerable. Bill Pinnock & Nigel Parker completed a grand slam, not -vulnerable.

Blackwood Convention (asking for Aces)

The Blackwood convention uses a bid of 4NT to ask partner how many A's he/she has. A 5C response indicates 0 or 4 Aces. A 5D response indicates 1 Ace. A 5H response indicates 2 Aces. A 5S response indicates 3 Aces. A 4NT bid is always considered to asking for Aces unless NT has been bid previously. Once you have established Aces, you may proceed to bid 5NT to ask for Kings with the responses being the same. 6C implies no Kings or 4 Kings, 6D implies 1 King, 6H implies 2 Kings and 6S implies 3 Kings. If you have 1 or more Aces and partner responds 5C, then you know for sure that partner has no Aces. If you have no Aces and partner responds 5C and you have both bidding quite heavy, then you know partner has 4 Aces.

Wednesday afternoon Contract Bridge is always looking to increase their numbers.

The curling rink has pretty much all of the equipment you need, simply show -up in relatively warm athletic sportswear with clean running shoes (i.e. no dirt or salt). New players, however, are welcome at any point during the season. If you show up ready to curl, we'll put you on a team!


This is a drop-in activity where players bowl 3 games (cost is \$16). A weekly 50/50 draw generates funds which are put towards prizes.
